Pitt-Greensburg welcomes new president, Dr. Robert Gregerson

On July 1, Robert "Bob" G. Gregerson, PhD, stepped onto campus as Pitt-Greensburg's fifth president and has spent the summer becoming familiar with our programs, meeting faculty and staff, and meeting members of the greater Greensburg community. He also is interacting with students at events, like the Student Activities Fair and Coffee with the President, a soon-to-be regular monthly event designed to allow him to dialogue with students. The owner of a new Twitter account, @pittgbgpres, Gregerson looks forward to interacting with a wider community via social media.

An official biography for Gregerson is available here <http://bit.ly/GregersonBio>, and it details the academic path (he's a biologist who minored in German) and career path that brought him to Pitt-Greensburg. Blue & Gold asked Gregerson if there was a defining moment when he knew he was ready to step into the role as president of a college campus.

"There wasn't an epiphany, it was more of a gradual change in my thinking," he said. "When I had been a dean for about five years, I started asking myself 'what's next?' I had been a student and faculty member at two different small colleges, and I was really feeling a pull back to that type of environment—where education happens on a personal scale. So, my goal was to make myself competitive for a presidency at a small public university. I think that being a dean is the perfect preparation for that role, and I guess that turned out to be true."

As Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Florida Gulf Coast University, he had 23 direct reports and the college served approximately 6,100 students. He also worked closely with development personnel to create an advancement plan for the college that cultivated and stewarded donors. He notes that his guiding philosophy is pretty simple, "Treat others the way you hope to be treated—with respect, courtesy, empathy, and dignity. All of life's important endeavors are based on human relationships. If the foundation of our relationships is mutual respect and support, then everything else is working out the details together."

Blue & Gold asked Gregerson about what motivates him. His answer: "I am motivated by enabling student success; everything we all do at Pitt-Greensburg should be in support of that goal. I like working collaboratively with others to solve problems and get things done. I respect people who are willing to work hard to accomplish their goals."

On a more personal note, Gregerson is married to his high-school sweetheart, Sarah. They are the parents of three sons, two who live in Georgia and one who lives in Florida. His favorite place (other than Pitt-Greensburg) is the Top of the Baths restaurant on Virgin Gorda in the British Virgin Islands. "It has the most beautiful view I've ever seen, and the food is great. It also has a swimming pool IN the restaurant!" He adds that anywhere in Belize or Costa Rica are tied for second place.



NYT best-selling author and mental health advocate Kate Fagan speaks to students

New York Times best-selling author Kate Fagan spoke to a full auditorium when she visited campus in early October as part of the campus' observance of Mental Health Awareness Week. Her visit was sponsored by the Pitt-Greensburg Athletic Department and the Academic Village.

Fagan, a former columnist and feature writer for ESPN.com and ESPN The Magazine, wrote the number-one bestseller *What Made Maddy Run*, a profile of University of Pennsylvania student-athlete Madison Holleran whose 2014 suicide rocked the campus community. The book examines Holleran's struggle with depression, revealing the mounting pressures facing young adults, specifically student-athletes in the rise of social media and constant connectivity.

"Having Kate come and speak to our campus was such a tremendous opportunity for our students," said Jeromy Yetter, director of athletics. "Kate speaks on a regular basis at some of the largest universities across the nation, and we feel lucky to have had her visit our campus in October. Mental health is such an important topic today and using this opportunity to bring further awareness will benefit our students and campus."

Women's Soccer earns regional ranking

At this writing, in late September, the women's soccer team is off to a great start in pre-conference play, posting a 6-0-0 record and earning the No. 8 (September 17 poll) spot in the United Soccer Coaches Association Division III Top 25 for the Great Lakes Region. Freshman Ashley Lucas has scored in every game, including two goals against Muskingum and three assists against Chatham. As goalkeeper, junior Alexa Fetterman posted her first shutout and two saves of the season against Geneva College. Other players to watch are sophomore Tiffany Michalek, second on the team in scoring with six goals, and sophomore goalkeeper Lauren Yoder, who has only allowed two goals in five games while posting 20 saves. The men's soccer team is off to a 1-4 start as of this writing. Their lone win came against Saint Vincent College, where the Bobcats posted a shutout against the Bearcats. Freshman Carson Gilarno, junior Tyrell Dommies, and sophomore Dylan Willard each have one goal for the season. Freshman Javin Melvin leads the team in assists (2), followed by junior Nick Bono (1).

The women's volleyball team opened their season with a 2-10 record (as of September 23), posting wins against Waynesburg University and Chatham College. Sophomore Alexis Ray leads the team with 102 points and 24 blocked shots in 12 matches. She is followed by freshman Emma Halutick with 89.5 points and sophomore Mackenzie Schropp with 78.0 points. Defensively, senior Kassi Niver leads the team with 4.12 digs per set, Freshman Zoe Sheffler has posted 23 blocks in 12 games.

A young—mostly freshmen and sophomores—women's tennis team is off to a slow start, posting a 1-5 record for September. The team posted their win against Bethany College. Sophomore Miranda Berkebile, along with freshmen teammates Reilly Reis, Xiangting Tang, Kelsey Murphy, and Alycia Zummo have each posted one win for the season against various opponents. The team is 0-3 in conference play.



The men's tennis team is 1-1 overall and 1-1 in conference play. The Bobcats' 5-4 win came against Mount Aloysius College. With the match tied 4-4 heading into the final match, sophomore Andrew Oden was able to come back from a 2-5 deficit in the second set to force a tiebreaker. His victory in the tiebreaker sealed the win for the Bobcats. Freshman Turner Price leads the Bobcats with an 11-3 record for the season. Price and junior Vaughn Hunkele are 6-7 in doubles play.

Redstone Highlands Creates Unique Nursing Scholarship

Healthcare management internship also established

Redstone Highlands, a senior living facility with locations in Westmoreland County, is partnering with the University of Pittsburgh at Greensburg to provide a unique scholarship opportunity for our baccalaureate nursing students. Announced this past spring, Redstone Highlands is offering one full-tuition, four-year scholarship at Pitt-Greensburg, worth up to \$17,500 per academic year.

What makes the scholarship unique is that it offers the recipient the opportunity to work at a Redstone Highlands facility as a paid member of the staff, earn the nurse aide certification at the employer's expense, and work for two years in a full-time position as a registered nurse after receiving his or her nursing degree. (Graduates choosing not to accept a position with Redstone agree to pay back the scholarship funds awarded.) The scholarship also makes housing available to the award recipient, should the student choose to accept it.

"The idea for the scholarship began several years ago when Redstone was positioning itself as an anchor organization for the community," said John Dickson IV, CEO of Redstone Presbyterian SeniorCare. "Using data from recent community-health needs assessments, we identified the macro and micro issues affecting the health and well-being of the community."

To address the macro issues, Redstone initiated programs to bring better health to the community through awareness. Redstone also identified how they could enhance the lives of their employees. Through a survey of its 400 employees, in which 81 percent participated, Redstone found that, in addition to identifying food insecurity issues and daycare needs, many employees were looking for debt forgiveness or tuition assistance. Along with instituting an income-based tuition-assistance program for daycare, Redstone also allocated money for scholarships.

"We looked at how we could get involved with higher education so that people can get degrees to become nurses as well as have the opportunity to have housing, which leads to an inter-generational living experience," said Dickson, who also serves on the Pitt-Greensburg Advisory Board. "We came up with \$65,000 for tuition assistance, and now we have people moving from RNs to BSNs with Carlow University, one person getting an RN degree through Westmoreland County Community College, as well as the full-tuition scholarship awarded to a Pitt-Greensburg BSN student."

Madalein Lorince, a first-year nursing student, is the recipient of the first award. She is enrolled in Pitt-Greensburg's BS in nursing program and her career goals include becoming a nurse practitioner followed by becoming a doctor.

"I am working at Redstone as a nursing assistant," said Lorince. "I enjoy being able to build my medical background and learning things that will help me excel in my future occupation. I plan to earn my CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant) license within the next year or less, so I will have one license under my belt as I obtain my BSN!"

Students must work a minimum of eight hours a week at a Redstone Highlands or Redstone@Home as part of the scholarship agreement. Lorince is able to schedule from eight to 30 hours a week with Redstone, depending on her class schedule.

To apply for the scholarship, students must make application through Redstone Presbyterian SeniorCare. Eligibility to apply includes having been accepted into Pitt-Greensburg's BSN program, earning a 3.0 grade-point average for the previous educational year, and submitting an essay that details the applicant's interest in working with the senior population as well as goals and purpose for applying for the scholarship. Two letters of recommendation are also required.

Redstone Highlands also established an internship in partnership with the Pitt-Greensburg healthcare management major. The internship requires a minimum of 10 weeks per semester and may be extended to additional semesters.

Senior biological sciences major Faryaal Alam interned with Redstone Senior Care this summer as part of her minor in healthcare management. The internship is designed to provide a broad experience by using rotations through various departments and experiences.

"I got to learn so much by being in different parts of Redstone every time I went in (to work)," said Alam. "I also enjoyed having the chance to network with everyone and gain valuable insight into the field."



Wednesday, November 13, will feature Coffee & Donuts with Dependents, a Try It Out event, and the WWII speaker. Thursday, November 14, will feature a Resource Fair for veteran and military students. The week closes on Friday, November 15, with a campus RED OUT—everyone wears red in support of active military—and the official removal of the commemorative wreath. 

Accolades and Awards



For the ninth consecutive year, Pitt-Greensburg earned Victory Media's **Military Friendly School** designation for meeting and exceeding the Military Friendly Standards in all six categories.

Marie A. Fioravanti, DNP, RN, is the recipient of the University of Pittsburgh's **School of Nursing Cameos of Caring Award**. Fioravanti, the director of nursing and an associate professor of nursing, will accept the award at a gala dinner scheduled for November.



Pitt-Greensburg was awarded funding for two projects through the **Pitt Seed Project**. The Pitt-Greensburg Military and Veterans Program will use their funds for a two-year project to expand the development and execution of

scholarship, education, and support programs that benefit the Pitt-Greensburg military, veteran, and campus communities. The Center for Applied Research (CFAR) will use the funds they received for a two-year project that will enhance their education and training infrastructure, especially as it pertains to the undergraduate research assistants working with the center.

Pitt-Greensburg received funding through The **Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board** to expand alcohol awareness activities at the campus. Pamela Freger, director of the Health Center, will use the funding to implement programming to reduce underage drinking, reduce high-risk or dangerous drinking, and to promote responsible alcohol consumption by those of legal drinking age. The new programming will augment alcohol awareness strategies already in place.



Kristen Asplin, PhD, assistant professor of psychology, and **Jeanne Burth, EdD**, associate professor of education, are the recipients of funding through Pitt's **Open Education Resources (OER) grant program**. Asplin will use her grant to develop open education resources in the area of child development, and Burth will use her grant to create OER writing lesson and unit plans. Open Education Resources help students save money on course materials as well as providing faculty with the ability to customize their courses.

Program Updates



Thirty-six students marked a significant milestone in the pursuit of their bachelor's of science degrees in nursing (BSN) when they received their symbolic white lab coats at the **Gold-AACN White Coat Ceremony for Nursing** held in August. This is the second group of students in Pitt-Greensburg's program to participate in the ceremony that signifies the transition from classroom learning to clinical learning. The purchase of the white lab coats was made possible through two grants. The Westmoreland/Frick Hospital Foundation, which also funded the purchase of the lab coats for the 2018 ceremony, provided funding again this year. Additionally, Pitt-Greensburg was one of two schools in Pennsylvania and 50 nation-wide to receive funding from the Arnold P. Gold Foundation (APGF) through the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) to support this ceremony.



This summer, **McKenna Hall** underwent key renovations and was designated the **new home of the Pitt-Greensburg BSN program**. The space features a new skilled nursing lab with eight fully operational beds and two programmable mannequins, operated via the SimPad. A state-of-the-art Hovercam Pilot teaching station also was installed. Additionally, new virtual reality equipment was purchased and set up in Millstein Library specifically for use by nursing students. It includes a variety of software that will enhance nursing students' learning experience in anatomy and other subjects.

Pitt-Greensburg's psychology program continues to grow with the addition of **two new minors: clinical psychology and legal psychology**. The clinical psychology minor provides students with the opportunity to develop knowledge and skills that will allow them to communicate and work with mental health, counseling, or social work professionals. The legal psychology minor provides students with an overview of how psychological theory and research are becoming increasingly relevant to legal policy and judicial decision-making.

The **Creative and Professional Writing Program**, using grant funding from the Office of Academic Affairs, will expand its curriculum with new writing courses that focus on writing and the healing arts. In spring 2020, the first in a series of five interconnected topics/courses will launch, all designed to help students across disciplines to engage with writing as a way to live deeper, more meaningful lives. Lori Jakiela, professor of English and director of the Creative and Professional Writing program, will teach the courses, which include Writing and Happiness, Writing About and Through Trauma, Experimental Writing, Place-Based/Home Writing, and Food and Family.

Prospective students interested in competing for one of Pitt-Greensburg's **three full-tuition scholarships** should plan to have their scholarship applications completed and submitted no later than January 22, 2020. The applicants should also have completed the admission application process to Pitt-Greensburg and be an admitted



Hon. Austin A. Davis '12 PGAA Alumnus of Distinction

Hon. Austin A. Davis '12 was the recipient of this year's Alumnus of Distinction Award, which acknowledges excellence among Pitt-Greensburg alumni and is the highest honor given by the PGAA.

"I am honored and humbled to be selected as this year's Alumnus of Distinction," said Davis, who serves as the Pennsylvania State Representative for the 35th Legislative District. "My passion and commitment for public service was fostered at Pitt-Greensburg, and I would not be the public servant I am today without those experiences. It is my hope that the University continues to inspire students to seek careers in public service."

At an early age, Davis made the decision to dedicate his life and career to public service. In high school he founded and served as chairman of McKeesport Mayor James Brewster's Youth Advisory Council. By the time he graduated high school in 2008, Davis decided to attend the University of Pittsburgh at Greensburg, with his sight set on pursuing a degree in political science.

"Austin's passionate interest in politics and policy came shining through as a student at Pitt Greensburg," said Paul Adams, PhD, Behavioral Science Division chair and associate professor of political

She won first place at a local conference for her poster presentation. Cayla was a true leader on this campus, an outstanding student, and a compassionate person."

At Pitt-Greensburg, Ray co-founded the Pre-Health Committee, developed guidebooks for entrance into health programs, and organized study groups for graduate admissions tests. A regular volunteer at The End Hunger Café, she posted more than 400 volunteer hours.

The recipient of the Tami Hunger Award (2019) for most community service at ASDOH in four years, she served as the community service committee coordinator for the local chapter of the American Association of Public Health Dentistry, and she founded and served as president of the ASDOH chapter of Students United with America's Toothfairy (SUAT).
